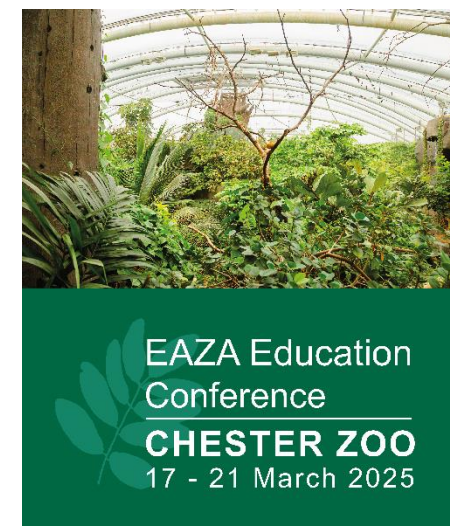


EAZA EDUCATION CONFERENCE 2025 PRESENTATION FORMATS

Please choose your preferred means of presentation

Please keep in mind you may be asked to consider a different format, depending on the review committee's response and further programme development.



Format	Description
--Talk-- <i>7-minute presentation + 3-minute Q&A</i>	7-minute presentations sharing an example of best practice or research findings relevant to one of the conference themes. Talks will be followed by a Q&A. Talks will be delivered in a hybrid format, to both the in-person and online audiences.
--Masterclass-- <i>90-minute</i> <i>~ 30 participants</i> <i>Option 1: Online Masterclass</i> <i>Option 2: In-person Masterclass</i>	<i>90 minute interactive workshops that enable participants to develop their abilities as conservation education practitioners and/or leaders. Proposals should specify who would benefit from attending their masterclass (for example is it for education programme managers, practitioners delivering workshop to schools, informal learning professionals etc.) and what the skills are that will be developed through the session. Masterclasses should be focused on developing the skills of participants, rather than showcasing case studies. Masterclasses will be delivered to either the in-person audience or an online audience and should be tailored to the chosen format and audience. There will not be a hybrid option.</i>

<p>--Discussion session--</p> <p>90-minute</p> <p>~ 30 participants</p> <p>Option 1: Online Masterclass</p> <p>Option 2: In-person Masterclass</p>	<p>90 minute interactive workshops that invite participants to get involved in discussing a key topic, contributing to position statements, current research programmes or gathering information about the current status of a particular area of zoo education work, relevant to the conference themes. They should focus on encouraging discussion between and contribution from delegates, although there may be a small element of information sharing as a provocation for the discussion. In addition, they should focus on issues that impact the wider sector, rather than the work of an individual organisation. Discussion sessions will be facilitated for either the in-person audience or online audience and should be tailored to the chosen format and audience.</p> <p>There will not be a hybrid option.</p> <p>NOTE: An online workshop will be held in January 2025 to provide support and guidance to anyone whose discussion session idea is accepted into the conference programme.</p>
<p>-- Video posters or speed talks--</p> <p>Option 1: 4-minute pre-recorded video poster</p> <p>Option 2: 4-minute live speed talk</p>	<p>4-minute pre-recorded video posters sharing an example of best practice or key research finding relevant to one of the conference themes. Can also be presented live as a speed talk. Video Posters/speed talks will be delivered in a hybrid format, to both the in-person and online audiences.</p>

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
